## President's Message

Dear YMCA Members and Friends.

In 2019, YMCA continued our mission to serve communities, as it has done for the last 117 years. Highlights of our achievements include YMCA being awarded the Charity Council's Charity Transparency Award and SG Enable's Enabling Employers Award, and having organised the first-ever YMCA Special Needs Expedition to Mount Fuji. YMCA's Board continued to improve board effectiveness and strengthened corporate governance. In 2019, YMCA Advisory Council was re-appointed, with Mr Lim Boon Heng, Chairman of Temasek Holdings, as the newly appointed Chairman. We would like to thank Mr S Dhanabalan for his outstanding contributions as the "founding chair" of the YMCA Advisory since 2011.

As a Christian service organisation, YMCA continually strives to "serve more, serve better", and be a channel of God's blessing. Allow me to share more of 2019's highlights with you.

**Financial Stewardship:** The efforts of our members, volunteers, board and staff to be good stewards of God's resources have led to a fruitful financial performance in 2019. Thanks to various fundraising activities and the generosity of our donors, we ended the year with a surplus of some \$839,000. Efforts included the launch of the YMCA Community Services Fund at the YMCA Giving Gala 2019. We are pleased to share that over \$350,000 has been raised for the fund through securing 32 Charter Donors who donated \$10,000 or more.

Serving God, Serving Communities: In 2019, we mobilised some 6,000 volunteers to serve more than 23,500 beneficiaries through over 15 community service programmes. These included Y Camp Challenge which engages persons with severe disabilities in outdoor activities, and YMCA Project Bridge which reaches out to youth-at-risk. They also included YMCA Proms 2019, a carnival that celebrated inclusivity and served as a volunteering platform for 10 corporations, and YMCA Silver Fiesta 2019, a two-day event that promoted active lifestyles and digital literacy with a turnout of over 1,200 seniors and 575 volunteers.

Serving Youth, Developing Social Capital: As a youth organisation, we expose our youth to social service and set them on the path of lifelong community service. Through the YMCA-Lim Kim San Volunteers Programme, we recruited and provided training to volunteers, empowering 38 corporations and 18 institutions to join us in serving others. 2019 also marked the 17th year of the Citi-YMCA Youth For Causes Programme, which recruited 400 student-volunteers and provided them with mentorship and seed funding to conceptualise and execute projects to benefit Social Service Agencies (SSAs) of their choice. The youth raised \$640,000 and mobilised over 9,900 volunteers to benefit 45 SSAs. YMCA's university service club, Uni-Y also did us proud by developing socially conscious community leaders across



4 local universities. We mobilised 238 university volunteers to conduct over 10,500 hours of voluntary service.

**Serving Members, Enriching Lives:** We continue to engage YMCA Members through various platforms, including Fitness and Dance Programmes and Outdoor and Adventure Programmes. Through diverse activities, we hope to serve as a second home where members can pursue their passions and expand their horizons.


Strengthening Social Enterprises: YMCA Child Development Centres (CDCs) are an important platform for us to nurture our young in conducive environments according to our Christian values. I am pleased to announce that we will start operating one more YMCA CDC in June 2020. YMCA has also applied to join the ECDA Partner Operator Scheme, which will enable us to keep fees affordable, build capabilities to raise quality, and improve career prospects for Early Childhood professionals. We thank God for the opportunity to serve and seek everyone's prayers for the authority's favour in our application, to serve more children.

Word of Thanks: We thank God for His favour and blessings that He has showered upon the YMCA of Singapore over the years. Together with the Board of Directors, I would like to thank our Patron-in-Chief and President of Singapore Mdm Halimah Yacob, YMCA Advisory Council, members, volunteers, donors, partners and staff for their invaluable contributions. 

# General Secretary & CEO's Message

Dear YMCA Members, Staff and Friends,

In 2019, we were committed to YMCA Strong objectives: To challenge, champion and train children, youth, volunteers and our other clients to stand up and be counted as independent and effective contributors to an inclusive society. YMCA Strong is a statement of our desired outcome for all we serve – to give them a hand up, not simply a handout, so that each one will be strengthened to reach new heights.

Strengthening youth with special needs, youthat-risk, youth leaders, the elderly, our members and volunteers remain the core thrust of our YMCA programmes.

Amongst all the incredible work the board, staff and volunteers have put in, one particular programme captured the essence of the YMCA Strong spirit: The inaugural YMCA Special Needs Expedition to Mount Fuji.

It saw a team of 10 individuals with special needs achieve something seemingly impossible as they attempted to summit the tallest mountain in Japan. Our team consisted of individuals with cerebral palsy, visual impairments, autism and a bone cancer survivor. Witnessing their positivity, dedication and perseverance, sparked a similar strength within the accompanying volunteers. Together, we reached 3,200 metres, before being forced to descend due to harsh weather conditions. Despite the disappointment, the climb



was an extraordinary journey that highlighted that every individual has special abilities, not just special needs.

In October, we were also pleased to launch the YMCA Special Needs Hospitality Training Programme. Each intern was paired with our staff mentors who themselves have disabilities as both are strengthened to be gainfully employed and increasinally independent.

These two programmes are literally just a sampling of the wide-ranging programmes and social enterprises that the YMCA runs, but they do well to embody the YMCA Strong spirit to strengthen and empower.

On that note, I would like to especially thank board, members, staff, donors, sponsors, partners, volunteers and clients who have so generously given of themselves to strengthen the YMCA and I look forward to another year together on this YMCA Strong spirit.

# Community Service Programmes

# Highlights of Community Service Programmes



#### Y Arts Challenge

Y Arts Challenge engages persons with special needs through performing and visual arts. It gives them a platform for creative self-expression, develops their talents and showcases them through avenues such as art exhibitions and performances at events. Through this, their confidence and self-esteem are strengthened.



#### Y Camp Challenge

Y Camp Challenge is an outdoor adventure camp for clients with special needs, creating opportunities for social integration with their volunteers. By overcoming their perceived limitations in various activities such as high rope elements and camp craft, YMCA aims to grow their confidence, resilience and social skills.



#### YMCA Inclusive Climb 2019

The first-ever YMCA Special Needs Expedition to Mount Fuji in August saw a total of 10 special needs climbers scaling Mount Fuji. This is part of the Y Camp Challenge Initiative that empowers special needs clients through outdoor activities to grow their confidence and resilience.



#### Y Food of Love

Volunteers are equipped with baking skills at Y Food of Love. Their baked delicacies are then distributed to clients at their homes or activity centres. These visits often include befriending and interacting with clients through games and activities that bring them joy.

#### Y Outing

Through a range of indoor and outdoor activities and excursions, Y Outing engages clients with special needs to build confidence and acquire life skills such as personal safety, socially acceptable behaviour and responsibility. This programme also boosts their interpersonal and communication skills with one another and allows them to form friendships with volunteers.



#### Y Makan Fellowship

Held monthly, the elderly are treated to a sumptuous meal at Y Makan Fellowship. They also interact with volunteers who entertain them with songs, games and activities. This programme promotes bonding and improves communication skills between different generations.



#### Y Spring Clean

Volunteers visit elderly members, who may have physical or sensory disabilities, to create a clean and safe living environment.

Many of these seniors also live alone and appreciate the companionship and friendships formed through these sessions.





# International Service Programmes

YMCA International Service Programmes (ISPs) are always looking for sustainable ways to help. Dedicated to empowering communities and strengthening volunteers, YMCA ISPs reach out to less-privileged communities outside of Singapore, expanding YMCA's reach and exposing volunteers to other cultures.

To create a lasting impact, YMCA ISPs' community development projects focus on healthcare, education, infrastructural development, sustainability, climate change and capacity building. Some major projects in 2019 include involving 280 volunteers in building a school in Nepal, and bringing Singapore Polytechnic Optometry students to conduct eye screenings for the rural communities in Vietnam.

## YMCA FACES

The YMCA Financial Assistance and Capability for Employment Scheme (FACES) serves two major functions. Firstly, it provides emergency financial aid to families in need. These funds help them in affording daily necessities like groceries, health supplements and food.

Secondly, YMCA FACES also sustains meaningful work training opportunities for persons with special needs. It funds the YMCA Special Needs Hospitality Training Programme, which recruits interns with special needs and trains them in hospitalityrelated vocational skills. Through nurturing them in a real-life working environment, they develop confidence and social skills, increasing their employability and strengthening them in independent living.

# Project Bridge

YMCA Project Bridge reintegrates out-of-school youth and youth-at-risk through programmes that strengthen their skill sets, employability and character development. It is implemented through the Vocational and Soft Skills Programme (VaSSP), and Drop-In-Youth Programme.

VaSSP equips out-of-school youth with vocational skills including make-up, hairdressing, and culinary skills among others, as well as soft skills such as interviewing skills and writing resumes. The youth also receive emotional and social support from social workers in the process, supporting their reintegration into school or into the workforce.

# Youth Leadership & Development Programmes

Youth are the heart of the YMCA of Singapore. Through our Youth Development Programmes, we strive to nurture the future leaders of Singapore. By developing their creativity, compassion and various skill sets, these youth become experienced, knowledgeable individuals who can become potential social service staff and volunteers.

This year, four students made up Team
QANEBrella under the Citi-YMCA Youth For
Causes programme. The programme provides
funding and mentorship to students to
conceptualise and execute projects to benefit
Social Service Agencies of their choice. The
team from St Joseph's Institution International
made the news with their innovative project.

They wanted to create a safer mobility aid after witnessing an elderly get injured when her walking stick gave way.

Through their creativity, they created a "portable mobility aid holder" named "QANEmate" that helped to secure mobility aids to any surface. These products were so well-received that about 1,000 QANEmates have been given to seniors in Singapore and to countries as faraway as Finland.

They went further and created the QANEBrella – a walking stick that also functioned as an umbrella. Their achievements show the impact and change youth can bring with guidance and support.



# Speaking Awards

The YMCA Speaking Awards, which comprises of the YMCA Plain English Speaking Awards and YMCA Mandarin Speaking Awards, are national-level speaking competitions designed to enhance critical thinking and speaking skills among youth. Apart from building confidence and enhancing communication skills, the competition encourages civic and social activities by involving participants in experiential learning. Through visits to Social Service Agencies and having them share their experiences from interacting with diverse clients, they are exposed to social service and are encouraged to become active citizens and future leaders of Singapore. The YMCA Mandarin Speaking Awards went on a hiatus in 2019.

## Citi-YMCA Youth For Causes

The Citi-YMCA Youth For Causes (YFC) encourages social entrepreneurship and community leadership development among Singapore's youths. Funded by Citi Foundation, it provides seed funding, mentorship and a fundraising license to 400 youths every year to conceptualise and execute projects to raise funds and awareness for social causes of their choice. From real-life experience championing a social cause to innovating creative campaign ideas, YFC participants strengthen their entrepreneurial spirit and social responsibility through active learning outside the classroom.

YFC participants also have the opportunity to equip themselves with further skills through the YMCA-NUS Business School Volunteer Service Management Programme, facilitated by lecturers from NUS Business School.

## International House

YMCA Clubs

YMCA of Singapore reaches out to touch the lives of those in need, and also strives to nurture those within. YMCA Clubs are valuable platforms where members can pursue their passions while forming meaningful networks with like-minded individuals.

For the International Y's Men's Club of Singapore (Alpha Chapter), being together enables them to gather their efforts and impact others even more effectively. As the service club of the YMCA, they serve various clients through YMCA's community service activities, and through partnerships with Social Service Agencies such as SARAH Seniors Activity Centre (SAC).

In 2019, the club spread love and joy to the SAC's residents, celebrating major festivals with them including Chinese New Year, Mid-Autumn Festival and Christmas. They organised a hairdressing session before Chinese New Year for the seniors, offering grooming services in preparation for the festive season. They celebrated with the seniors through parties, treating them to food and entertainment. They also brought clients on monthly grocery trips and outings to places of interest.

# International Y's Men's Club of Singapore (Alpha Chapter)

The International Y's Men's Club of Singapore (Alpha Chapter) is affiliated to the YMCA of Singapore. Open to like-minded people and all YMCA members who desire to serve the community through volunteerism, it supports YMCA's community service and fundraising activities.

In partnership with Parkinson Society Singapore, the Club organised monthly karaoke sessions held at YMCA of Singapore for people with Parkinson's. These sessions improve the lives of participants and is also a platform for music lovers to have fun and socialise through singing.

During the year, the Club supported YMCA by volunteering at YMCA Silver Fiesta 2019 and adopting SARAH Seniors Activity Centre through monthly Y Outings. The Club also held a Christmas party for the activity centre to bring cheer to them during the festive season.



#### YMCA Folk Dance Group

The YMCA Toastmasters Club is a place of empowerment – through developing communication and leadership skills that foster confidence in a supportive and conducive learning environment. Toastmasters experience personal growth and encourage each other on a journey that includes speech contests such as the International Speech and Table Topics Contest, and the Humorous Speech and Evaluations Contest. These events also serve as platforms to showcase their excellent speech delivery skills that they continue to refine and build on.

In 2019, YMCA Toastmasters Club continued touching lives and nurturing the community through welcoming members from diverse cultural backgrounds and developing their communication skills. They hosted bi-weekly meetings, educational talks, mentorship programmes, speech contests and festival celebrations.

## **Policies**

YMCA of Singapore is governed by the Constitution of the Association and has complied with the Code of Governance for Charities and Institutions of Public Character.

#### **BOARD GOVERNANCE**

#### Office Begrers

At the first meeting of the Board of Directors (BOD) held after the Annual General Meeting, a President, two Vice Presidents, an Honorary Secretary, and an Honorary Treasurer of the Association are elected from among the members of the BOD for a period of one year or until their successors are elected. No person is elected as the Honorary Treasurer or otherwise hold the office of Honorary Treasurer for more than 4 consecutive terms and such person shall only be eligible for re-election as Honorary Treasurer after a lapse of at least 1 year.

#### **Executive Committee**

The Executive Committee ("ExCo") comprises the President, two Vice Presidents, an Honorary Secretary, and an Honorary Treasurer. It has the executive powers to administer the affairs of the Association in accordance with its Constitution, Rules and Regulations and the Board's policy and provides guidance and oversight to the Management on the operations of the Association. These include the setting of policies on operational matters and approval of expenditures within the financial limits provided for in the Chart of Authority ("COA") in the normal course of business. ExCo keeps the BOD fully informed on the affairs of the Association and where appropriate, refer certain matters to the BOD for approval.

#### **HUMAN RESOURCE MANAGEMENT**

There are systems for regular supervision, appraisal and professional development of staff and a system to address grievances and resolve conflicts. The HR department is advised by a Staff Committee commissioned by the Board. The Committee reviews and advises on all HR policies relating to staff compensation, benefits and strategies to attract, retain and motivate staff, on the receipt of recommendations from the General Secretary & CEO. The Committee also advises on talent identification and development programmes for staff and succession planning of senior management staff.

#### **Whistle Blowing Policy**

The YMCA Whistle Blowing policy aims to provide an avenue for employees and external parties to raise concerns and offer reassurance that they will be protected from victimisation for whistle blowing in good faith.

This policy covers issues where the following may be suspected:

- 1. Corruption;
- 2. Acts of fraud;
- 3. Theft and/misuse of the Association's properties, assets or resources; or
- 4. Breach of laws

No staff is involved in setting his or her own remuneration. Staff remuneration is subject to remuneration guidelines approved by the BOD.

The Association discloses in its annual report the annual remuneration of its three highest paid staff who each receives remuneration exceeding \$100,000, in bands of \$100,000, or the fact that none of its top three highest paid staff receives more than \$100,000.

## FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT AND CONTROLS

The BOD ensures that documented procedures are in place for financial matters in key areas. The BOD also ensures reviews and enhances monitoring on controls, processes, key programmes and events.

The BOD reviews and approves an annual budget for the Association's plans and regularly monitors financial performance.

The financial statements of the Association are drawn up in accordance with the Statement of Financial Reporting Standards in Singapore ("FRS").

The Association discloses its reserves policy in the annual report.

The Association does not make any loans.

#### **Reserves Policy**

YMCA targets for three years of operating reserves with a minimum of one year from donations and surpluses generated through our social enterprises. These reserves will ensure that our ability to serve the community is not subjected to the vagaries of the economy. As at the end of 2019, our ratio of reserves to annual operating expenditure stands at 0.6 years.

The restricted funds and their purposes are as follows:

I. Building Asset Capitalisation Reserve – to match amounts on capital projects undertaken with past donations designated for that purpose. This fund will be amortised in line with the depreciation policy of the underlying capital projects

II. Disaster Relief Fund – to support the volunteer relief and rehabilitation works undertaken by the Association in Sri Lanka, following the 2004 Indian Ocean Earthquake & Tsunami

III. YMCA-Seet Hiong Kiat & Kuah Siew Eng Education Funds – to fund tertiary education for overseas needy students

IV. ISP Project Fund – set up for the International Service
Programmes (ISP) and it is to be used for future ISP projects

V. Rebuilding Community @ Dujiangyan Fund – set up for the purpose of supporting YMCA's rebuilding programmes in Sichuan, China

VII. ITE Elevate Fund – to engage, equip and empower disadvantaged students from ITE towards completing their education and improving their prospects for employment or future education. This programme contributes to an increase in overall resilience to cope with stresses and reduction of risk behaviours for youth who are at risk.

YMCA has also other designated and unrestricted funds set aside for various community programmes listed in the Notes to the Financial Statements. YMCA has also designated a percentage of our annual surpluses from our social enterprises for large scale asset renewal as our capital replacement fund.

#### **Investment Committee**

The Investment Committee is governed by the Investment Charter and the Investment Policy which are constantly reviewed to allow for flexibility according to the market environment. It is appointed by the BOD to exercise prudence and good stewardship in relation to the investment of the Association's funds to look into generating higher returns in the long run with a reasonable amount of risk.

#### DISCLOSURE AND TRANSPARENCY

There is a Conflict of Interest policy endorsed by the Board. Annually, the Board Directors and Management Staff make declarations of actual or potential conflicts of interest to the Board.

It is compulsory for all Board members to make annual declaration of interests, to be signed and acknowledged by the President of the Association and presented to the Board.

At committee meetings, the General Secretary & CEO of the Association will announce potential conflict of interest and Board members who are faced with a conflict situation are excluded from decision making processes relating to the matter.


#### **FUNDRAISING PRACTICES**

The Association has established guidelines on fundraising. These guidelines are based on the best practices set out by the National Council of Social Service and the Charity Council.


The committee for each fundraising event consists of volunteers and is supported by staff. The donors are informed of our objectives and targets.


